Victorians James Thomson and Robert van Veenendall convincingly won the Ernst \& Young International Flying Fitteen National Championships sailed on Canberra's Lake Burley Griffin from 1 to 10 January last. As expected, the series was sailed in light to medium wind conditions with breezes in all races varying between 1 and 15 knots. The sizeable number of spectators on the lake shores were however treated to a spectacular demonstration of Flying Fitteen performance when a line squall of 30 knots plus hit the fleet in the last race. Two keels were shown to the armchair experts but the rest of the 29 -strong fleet took off in clouds of spray, showing what has made the class so popular among small keelboat sailors over a period of many years.

Big gains and losses were made in the challenging inland sailing conditions with variable wind strength and direction. One top skipper said:
"At home I can relax once I get to the front of the fleet, but in Canberra I have to concentrate for the whole race. Changing conditions meant I could be involved in three or four races in one heat!"
Boats from all Australian fleets were represented in the series. Also, popular lan Cleaver (Scotland) and veteran Derek Walbourn (England) joined in the competition.

## THE RACING

Tuffa Gruffa sailed by James Thomson and Robert van Veenendall won the championships to the extent that they need not have sailed the last race. The high performing Queensland boat Corrangattack sailed by Ashley Smith and Phil Will repeated the performance they achieved in the 1990 Brisbane Nationals to come second, with the third place getter in the 1990 Worlds, lan Cleaver, coming third.

Canberra sailors filled the first two places in the handicap result with lan Hawke (Windsong) first and John Hosking (State of the Ark) second. Victorian sailor Ian Whitehead in Isn't it Amazing was third.

Race 1 was a race of fluctuating fortunes. Tuffa Gruffa led from Fanfare (Geoff Totterdell, WA) and Corrangattack for much of the race but tactical errors allowed Canberra boat Rustler (Peter Russell) in to win by a minute. This race underscored the fact that in lake racing, you never say die until the race is won. Rustler had started about two minutes later after a rules infringement.

Race 2 was a close contest in gusty wind conditions with a number of boats choosing the wrong side of the strategically placed Spinnaker Island. Tuffa Gruffa battled with Corrangattack and White Magic 2 (Mark Bulka, Vic) and ultimately won by three boat lengths from the Queensland boat with Fanfare third.

Three boats got away from the fleet in the light to medium conditions of Race 3. After a close race Rustler started to look very good with a 14-second win from Cunning Stunt and the Victorian boat Travelling Sailsman sailed by John Hawkins.

Race 4 was sailed in stronger breezes, enabling Tuffa Gruffa and Cunning Stunt to show their paces, filling first and second places respectively with Corrangattack further back in third place.

Ability to pick wind shifts in the 1 to 15 knot winds of Race 5 showed lan Cleaver (Cunning Stunt) hitting top gear with a win of more than a minute over Soggy Sox (Ron Walker, Qld) who had a spectacular last leg, followed by the new ubiquitous Tuffa Gruffa in third place.
Race 2 turned out to be the deciding race for Tuffa Gruffa. James Thomson handled the predominantly
light conditions withe elan to lead the fleet over the line. The second and third place getters, White Magic and Corrangattack were well behind. This result secured the series for Thomson.
The main interest in Race 7 was the minor placings which were wide open. Tuffa Gruffa sailed fast and loose in the 10-15 knot winds livened up with a $30-k n o t$ plus line squall to win. The race for second place was decided after seom aggressive tactics, with Corrangattack taking the honours for second place in an almost photo finish from Cunning Stunt.

## International Flying Fifteen

Victorians James Thomson and Robert van Veenendall convincingly won the Ernst \& Young International Flying Fifteen national championship sailed on Canberra's Lake Burley Griffin.

The series was sailed in light to medium winds that varied from one to 15 knots. The sizeable number of spectators that lined the shores of the lake, however, were treated to a 'flying"' Flying Fifteen spectacle in the final race when a 30 line squall hit the fleet. As a result two keels were shown to the audience, while the rest of the 29-boat fleet took off in clouds of spray.

Boats from all Australian fleets were represented at the regatta which also attracted international competitors in Scotland's Ian Cleaver and England's Derek Walbourn.

Tuffa Guffa, sailed by Thomson and van Veenendall, won the title without needing to sail the last race. Top performing Queensland entry Corangattack, sailed by Ashley Smith and Phil Will, repeated the performance achieved at the 1990 Brisbane nationals to come second. Third place getter at the 1990 Worlds, Ian Cleaver, finished third. Canberra sailors filled the first two places in handicap results, with Windsong (Ian Hawke) first and State of the Ark (John Hosking) second. Victorian skipper Ian Whitehead in Isn't it Amazing was third.

## THE CANBERRA NATIONALS


#### Abstract

The Nationals well justified "the friendly series" concept promoted by the Canberra fleet. Both on the water and off this was most noticeable and was commented upon by a number of club members. The results show that the challenging inland sailing conditions, with variable wind strength and direction, were mastered by most of the leading steady wind sailors from coastal regions. One top skipper commented that at home he could relax once he got to the front but in Canberra he had to concentrate for the whole race. changing conditions frequently meant that he would be involved in 3 or 4 races in that one race. The crews that were able to concentrate on boat speed and observation of the variable wind conditions were the ones who performed best in the series.


Entries for the Nationals in Canberra totalled 29; a disappointing number in view of the sponsorship obtained, the intensive publicity, and the prior planning which went into the organisation for these championships. For example, by the December lst closing date for entries, inspite of their closeness to Canberra only one entry had been received from Melbourne based fleets. Late entries, after intensive lobbying, increased this number to six, with three from Victorian country fleets. Four each came from much further afield, W.A. and Queensland, while two came from Overseas and one from the now defunct N.S.W. fleet. The remainder came from Canberra.

Social activities were well organised with highlights being visits to the "Gundaroo Pub" - a country bus ride to an outback pub with Aussie tucker; and an "At home with Canberra Fifteeners" who entertained the visitors in their homes one evening. Other activities included a welcome function arranged by the Club, a barbeque followed by a sports afternoon (this was won by the interstaters), and a very successful Presentation Dinner. The tourist facilities of Canberra were also heavily patronised by both crews and families.

The series was well publicized with the four local TV stations queueing up to record the event each day. A video of the series is in the final stages of editing. A copy will be forwarded to each State for use by members and promotional purposes. If you are unable to see a copy and would like to, please let us know and we will send one on loan.

## OUR SPONSORS.

## THE RACING

The Championships were very convincingly won by "Tuffa Gruffa" sailed by James Thomson with Robert van Veenendall as crew. "Corangattack" sailed by Ashley Smith and Phil Will were second, with "Cunning Stunt" sailed by Ian Cleaver and Greg Wells. Results are overleaf.
The Handicap Series was won by Ian Hawke's "Windsong" from John Hosking's "State of the Ark", and Ian Whitehead's "Isnt it amazing".

## INVITATION RACE

Wind ENE variable. Speed 10 knots variable
"Tuffa Gruffa" (James Thompson - Vic)showed that in the variable wind conditions of inland sailing she had the form to become an early favourite for the championships. Geoff Totterdell in "Fanfare" was second, while Ron Walker in "Soggy Sox was third.

Wind NW - NE. Speed 2 -10 knots.
The race was one of fluctuating fortunes. "Tuffa Gruffa" led from "Fanfare" and "Corangattack"(Ashley Smith -Qld.) for much of the race, but they both made tactical errors at the last mark letting "Rustler" (Peter Russell - ACT) through to win by a minute. "Rustler" had started 2 minutes late after a rules infringement but steadily moved through the fleet to be up with the leaders by lap 3.

RACE 2
Wind W - N. Speed 5-15 knots
This was a close race in the gusty wind conditions with a number of boats choosing to sail on the "wrong" side of Spinnaker Island . "Tuffa Gruffa" battled with
"Corangattack" and "White Magic 2" (Mark Bulka - Vic.)
"Tuffa Gruffa" covered "Corangattack" to win by three boat lengths with "Fanfare" third.

RACE 3
Wind NW - NE. Speed 5-15 knots
In the light to medium winds three boats broke away from the rest of the fleet, and after a close race "Rustler" sailed through "Cunning Stunt" (Ian Cleaver - Scot.) on the final beat to win 14 seconds. "Travelling Sailsman" (John Hawkins -Vic.) was third.

## RACE 4

Wind N - NW. Speed 5-15 knots
In the stronger winds of this race "Tuffa Gruffa" lead throughout defending against the attacking "Cunning Stunt", who was only 15 seconds behind at the finish, with "Corangattack" further back in third place.

RACE 5
Wind NE - N. Speed $1-15$ knots
In this race of changing fortunes in a predominately good sailing wind ability to pick the shifts was of great importance. "Cunning Stunt" did just that to win by over a minute from "Soggy Sox" (Ronald Walker -Qld.) who gained many places on the last leg of the course to finish second with "Tuffa Gruffa" third.

RACE 6
Wind NW - N. Speed 0-7 knots
"Tuffa Gruffa" sailed a faultless race to be over 20 minutes ahead of the next boat as they neared the finish. Realizing that if he finished then about half the fleet would record a DNF (being more than 30 minutes behind) Jamie sailed up and down the line until "White Magic 2" hove into sight - a wonderful display of sportsmanship which was applauded by all. "Corangattack" finished third.

RACE 7
Wind NW. Speed 10 - 15 knots
With the series already won by "Tuffa Gruffa" interest centred on the minor placings which were wide open. "Tuffa Gruffa" again finished first in gusty winds which saw two boats capsize when a 30 knot line squall passed through the fleet. The race for second place was decided after some aggressive tactics, with "Corangattack" recovering first to cross the line only inches in front of "Cunning Stunt".
